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1 Introduction

OceCGI is a collection of CGI utilities made for use on ocelot.cascaded.net. OceCGI is maintained by Anton McClure (<http://www.ocelot.cascaded.net/~anton/>) <anton@ocelot.cascaded.net>.

As each of these CGI scripts are small and follow a cherrypicking of the Unix Philosophy (specifically "do one thing" with the exception of the "do one thing well"), the longest section of this manual is more than likely always going to remain the GNU Free Document License portion.

1.1 Downloading Flan

Flan is freely available at <http://www.ocelot.cascaded.net/~anton/ocecgi.html>. It is released under the GNU General Public Licence version 3 or later. See the file COPYING for details.

Tarballs downloads are available from Ocelot's FTP server over either the FTP (<ftp://ftp.ocelot.cascaded.net/users/anton/ocecgi/>), HTTP (<http://ftp.ocelot.cascaded.net/users/anton/ocecgi/>), and HTTPs (<https://ftp.ocelot.cascaded.net/users/anton/ocecgi/>) protocols.

1.1.1 Requirements

Flan requires the following packages:

- Build-time & Run-time
 - GNU Make
 - Perl

1.2 Running Flan for the First Time

Simply run the command:

```
$ocecgi
```

2 Users

The users script displays a list of users who have home pages on the server. This script has no editable options. It is based on the cvsweb users script by Ian Jackson.

Similar to chiark, it gets the list of users it should use from `/etc/userlist`. The string is hardcoded into the program, as it was originally written for specifically chiark's configuration. The chiark ways of doing things had been cherrypicked enough by ocelot that the script worked here as well, however.

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
